### Mesa water quality report available online

Do you know where your drinking water comes from and what's in it? Mesa water users can read all about the quality of the water they are drinking in the 2014 Water Quality Report, which is now available online at http://bit.ly/1Hg6oL8. A hard copy is available by calling 480-644-6461.

This year's annual report, which is also known as the Consumer Confidence Report, reveals that Mesa met more than 100 state and federal drinking water standards in 2014. The report includes information on both regulated and non-regulated contaminants, according to a press release.

Since 1999, the Environmental Protection Agency has required community water systems to generate an annual report which includes information about the source of water and the level, or range of levels, of certain contaminants in drinking water. All community water systems must have their annual report available by July 1.

### Final report from Citizens for Pets task force delivered

The Maricopa County Board of Supervisors on May 4 was presented with a final report and recommendations from the Citizens for Pets task force. The ad hoc committee was created by the board of supervisors in October and is comprised of nearly 30 citizens with a common goal - the care and well-being of homeless pets in the community, according to a press release.

The task force has spent the last six months reviewing several areas of Maricopa County Animal Care and Control and compiling a list of recommendations for the Board's consideration. According to MCACC Director Dr. Rodrigo Silva, approximately 50 percent of the Citizens for Pets task force recommendations are already being imple-

The task force presented the board of supervisors with a total of 35 major recommendations and 108 strategies in the following areas: medical care, sanitation, behavior, adoptions, marketing and outreach and budget and funding. The task force recommendations included:

- Hiring of additional veterinary staff.
- Improvements to MCACC's dog-evaluation process.
- Enhancement of MCACC volunteer program and outreach.

The board will review of all of the task force's recommendations.

Forty-three years ago this week the top news stories for the May 18, 1972.
